2022 LEAF COLLECTION

PLEASE NOTE: LEAVES WILL NOT BE PICKED UP ACCORDING TO A SPECIFIC SCHEDULE BECAUSE OF UNKNOWN FACTORS SUCH AS VOLUME OF LEAVES AND UNCERTAINTY OF WEATHER CONDITIONS. THE HIGHWAY CREW WILL BE OUT COLLECTING LEAVES EVERY DAY ALL DAY THROUGHOUT THE LEAF COLLECTION PERIOD

Leaf collection will begin the week of October 24th.

The last collection day will be Friday, December 9th.

- ▶ Rake leaves no more than 6 feet from the curb or edge of the road without blocking the roadway or storm drains. (The leaf vacuum cannot reach more than 6 feet)
- ▶ Do not mix grass or brush with leaves.
- ▶ Leaves in bags or trashcans will not be collected.
- ▶ The leaf vacuum and truck are too large to collect leaves between parked cars or near parked cars. Please allow at least eight feet of open space.

Beginning Tuesday, November 1st, the recycling center located at 285 Spanglers Mill Rd, New Cumberland, will begin winter hours as follows: Mon. through Fri. - 9:00 A.M. TO NOON (except holidays) and will be open the same time on the 1st and 3rd Saturday each month.

Both the Yard Waste and the Electronics Recycle Center are for residential use only

NO CONTRACTORS/BUSINESSES PERMITTED.

If a contractor can provide proof that he/she is currently doing work for a Fairview Township resident, they will be permitted to dispose of yard waste at the facility.

YARD WASTE GUIDELINES

285 Spanglers Mill Road, New Cumberland, PA 17070

DIRECTIONS:

From I-83, take exit 39A, turn left onto Lewisberry Road. In approximately 2 miles, turn right onto Spanglers Mill Road. The facility will be on your left.



DISPOSAL AT FACILITY:

- You must be a Township resident with residential refuse service.
- Township employees do not load or unload material(s).
- You must present a valid driver's license or other valid ID with your name and address.
- A Township employee will tell you if your yard waste is acceptable and may be unloaded.
- No dumping of yard waste permitted when the facility is closed.

ITEMS ACCEPTED

Tree limbs 6" diameter, 40 lbs.
Brush up to 4' in length
Plants and flowers
Shrubbery and pruning's
Christmas trees (Tinsel & ornaments removed)

ITEMS NOT ACCEPTED

Soil or Sod
Limbs over 6" in diameter
Construction Debris
Food Waste
Grass Clippings
Tree Stumps
Bricks, Stone, Concrete

PREPARATION FOR ITEMS ACCEPTED

Cut limbs/branches to 4-foot lengths. Place all acceptable yard waste in containers or bundle trimmings with rope, string or twine (no plastic or wire). Tied bundles are to be no more than 40 pounds and no longer than 4 foot in length.

*** Tree limbs from 6" to 10" in diameter and cut in 6" lengths will be accepted ***
ONLY if the resident takes to the facility during hours of operation

*** MULCH & LEAF COMPOST IS AVAILABLE FOR RESIDENCE TO PICK-UP ***

LEAF COMPOST AND WOODCHIPS (This Material is for Residential Use Only)

Leaf compost and woodchips will be free to residents during the hours listed above and while supplies last. You must present your driver's license or other form of identification showing you own a residence in the Township. It will be your responsibility to load the material.

STORMWATER MANAGEMENT



**YOUR STORM DRAIN
IS JUST FOR RAIN!**




As you clean up your lawn this fall, please do not rake leaves or other debris into storm drains. Only untainted rainwater should flow from your yard into storm drains. Lawn clippings, leaves and other debris often clump, contributing to a larger problem underground in the pipe system.


Even if you only “occasionally” allow grass clippings, leaves and other plants to wash down the drains...Multiply your “occasional” by the hundreds of subdivisions and thousands of homes in South Central PA region, and it’s easy to see why non-point source pollution is becoming a major concern.

The best option, ecologically speaking, is to re-mow your yard several times so the clippings will sink down into the lawn and break down quickly, providing valuable fertilizer.

HOW DOES A SEPTIC SYSTEM WORK?



1. All water runs out of your house from one main drainage pipe into a septic tank.
2. The septic tank is a buried, water-tight container. Its job is to hold the wastewater long enough for solids to settle to the bottom (sludge) while the fats, oil and grease float to the top (scum).
3. For conventional septic systems, liquid wastewater exits the tank and is spread evenly throughout the drainfield, usually through a distribution box. Systems with more advanced treatment may have an additional component between the septic tank and drainfield.
4. Once in the drainfield, the wastewater percolates into the soil, which reclaims the water nutrients.



This process may vary based on the site conditions of your property (e.g., soil type, proximity to water). A septic system’s “as built” drawings will be able to tell you what type of system is on the property.

Get an HVAC inspection



Inspect your home's outer walls ceiling, windows, doors and floors



Change your return filters forced air-heating systems.



There are few things worse than burst pipes in winter, so inspect your plumbing!



Get your roof checked out. If you don't take care of your roof, it will not take care of you!



Check or install weather stripping at doors, caulk around windows, adding storm windows or Window films when applicable.



Open curtains and blinds to let sun in through windows to help heat your home and shut them at night retain heat.



Seal up foundation and driveway cracks because during cold weather, moisture can seep into these areas and freeze causing surfaces to Crack and split.

Fall Outdoor Electrical Safety Tips

- Clear leaves from outdoor lighting, outlets, power cords and air conditioning units.
- Protect outdoor electric outlets and equipment from moisture.
- Check integrity of extension cords and replace as necessary.
- Don't overload outlets with too many plug-in decorations.
- Ensure electric blankets are in good repair and working condition.



NEED A CONTRACTOR

When hiring a contractor, the homeowner or contractor must apply for a permit about three weeks before the work begins. Building permits can take up to 15 business days because they are reviewed by a third party agency. If the contractor applies for a permit, the homeowner must ask the contractor for the permit to be displayed in the window of the residence. If the contractor does not get a permit, the homeowner is still legally responsible. If you have any questions as to whether a permit is required for the work to be done or if you have a problem with the actual permit, please call the Building/Zoning & Codes department at (717) 901-5220. Be sure of the permit and its cost before you pay a contractor for it!

Residential Building Permits - Not sure what type of Building Permit You Need?

Fairview Township requires permits for many types of construction and building work in residential structures. Some jobs will require only a "Zoning Permit" and other jobs will require a "Building Permit". These are separate permits with their own applications. Zoning permits fall under Township rules and ordinances. Building permits fall under Pennsylvania Uniform Construction Code and require inspection. Keep in mind, permits take time to review and process. Please allow up to seven business days for Zoning permits and three weeks for Building permits.

Construction and/or installation of a walkway on the property other than the sidewalk along the street. (This required a different permit.) (Township Ordinance 127-7)



What is the Pesticide Hypersensitivity Registry?

The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (PDA) maintains a registry of individuals hypersensitive to pesticides. It is a listing of locations for people who have been verified by a physician to be excessively or abnormally sensitive to pesticides. These hypersensitive individuals may request to have listings of their home, place of employment, school (if a student), and vacation home placed in the Registry. A person will not be considered included in the Registry unless their name appears in the current published Registry.



RENT-A-KID PROGRAM

This program, sponsored by the York County Area Agency on Aging, brings older adults and teenagers together. York County adults 60 years of age or older who need help with various household chores, including lawn mowing, yard work, snow removal, electronic devices and other odd jobs can contact the York County Area Agency on Aging to hire a teenager in their area. The seniors are asked to reimburse the teens a minimum of \$5/hour, or a negotiated rate based on the job. The teenagers are York County students in grades 7 through 12 or homeschooled. They must complete an application and have it signed by their parent and school guidance counselor. The teens are then entered into a regional database. When the older adults contact the agency, they are matched electronically with teenagers in their area. To obtain a Rent-A-Kid or for more information on the Rent- A -Kid Program, please contact York County Area Agency on Aging at (717) 771-9103 or 1-800-632- 9073.



(Neither adults or youth are screened by the York County Area Agency on Aging)

Fairview Township encourages all residents with special needs (e.g. deaf or blind) use a wheelchair or walker, use medical equipment, oxygen, ventilator, etc.) to register with York County Special Needs Registry. York County will forward information pertinent to emergency response and planning efforts to the Township.

The York County Special Needs Registry is a free, confidential, and voluntary program offered by the Office of Emergency Management to aide local municipalities in identifying those residents in their communities who may need additional assistance during an emergency or disaster, as required by state law. This includes, but is not limited to, individuals:

- with mobility difficulties
- with intellectual or developmental disabilities
- with sight or hearing impairments
- with special medical equipment
- without a reliable or consistent form of transportation
- without access to emergency information via TV, radio, internet



Any information provided is collected into a spreadsheet and then forwarded on to municipal Emergency Management Agencies to assist in emergency planning and response efforts.

The registry can be used for more than just evacuation purposes - the information it provides is also helpful in any emergency situation (fire, chemical spill, police incident, etc). All information is secure and confidential. Please use one of the links below to register.

TIPS FOR RESIDENTIAL HEATING OIL TANK OWNERS

Residential heating oil tanks are tanks used to store fuel oil to Provide space heating on premises where they are located.

Leaking Heating oil tanks can contaminate public and private drinking water supplies, pollute soils, create the potential for fires and explosions, and subject tank owners to very expensive cleanup costs that are often NOT covered by typical homeowner's insurance policies. With proper tank management, spills and leaks can be avoided. How can heating oil tanks be protected from spills and overfills?

- 1.) Routinely inspect the exterior of an aboveground tank and all attached equipment.
- 2.) Install spill and overfill prevention devices.
- 3.) Ensure the tank address is clearly visible and the fill line is clearly marked.
- 4.) Consider a secondary containment structure.

Indicators that a residential heating oil tank might be leaking or product has been spilled?

- Soil is saturated with heating oil
- Soil or other surface material around the fill pipe is stained
- Product vapors are in the soils or in the basement area
- Fuel is seeping into a basement, stream, underground utility, etc.
- Drinking water supplies are contaminated
- Fuel consumption has suddenly increased
- Furnace is operating erratically; and
- Neighbors are complaining of fuel oil odors.



The "Home Delivered Meals Program" is designed to provide a well-balanced daily meal to homebound older adults who are unable to prepare adequate meals for themselves and have no means for assuring healthful nutrition. On Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, a hot meal is delivered to the older adult's home. Tuesday and Thursday meals are a cold-bagged lunch delivered with the previous day's hot meal. Volunteers from the local senior center deliver the meals to the older adult's home. The Northeastern Senior Center is seeking volunteers for home delivered meals, please call (717) 266-1400 if you are interested. The home delivered meal service is not a cost shared service. Monetary donations can be made to the York County Agency on Aging.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS FOR DISPOSAL

PAINT: Latex and oil-based paint can be disposed of in your regular household trash. Simply add shredded paper, sand or kitty litter in the can to absorb any liquid. Place paint can into your household trash bag.

PRESCRIPTION MEDICATION: Remove medications from original container and mix with an undesirable substance, such as used coffee grounds or kitty litter. (The medication will be less appealing to children and pets, and unrecognizable to people who may intentionally go through your trash).

COVID-19 INFECTED MATERIALS: Contact the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) or your physician.

FIRE EXTINGUISHERS: Contact your local fire department or BFPE International at (717) 741-9980.

MEDICAL WASTE & MEDICATIONS: Dispose of needles and lancets in a designated household medical waste disposal system, or a rigid, lidded container with lid taped shut and labeled "SHARPS – DO NOT RECYCLE" and place in regular garbage.

GASOLINE & KEROSENE: Check with local businesses like auto garages as well as Pep Boys, Auto Zone, Advanced Auto Parts, Target, Walmart, Etc.

RECHARGEABLE BATTERY DISPOSAL LOCATIONS: (Regular alkaline batteries are to be thrown into your household trash) Rechargeable batteries such as Nickel Cadmium (NiCd), Nickel Metal Hydride (NiMH) or Lithium Ion (Li-Ion) should be recycled.

BASIC RESIDENTIAL GUIDELINES

- Trash, Recycling, one bulk item and yard waste (on scheduled dates) must be curb side by 6:00 AM on your scheduled collection day.
- No more than six (6) trash bags or containers will be collected per collection.
- Mobile Carts count as a total of three (3) bags or containers.
- Bags or containers must not exceed 32 gallons or 40 pounds.
- Bulk items that are too heavy to be lifted into a truck by two people will not be accepted.
- Call PennWaste to schedule collection of appliances containing freon (air conditioners, refrigerators, freezers, etc.)
- No construction debris will be collected curb side.

- Paints, Stain, Chemicals and Liquids

- Automobile Parts
- Household Hazardous Waste
- Tires on Rims
- Commercial and Industrial Waste
- Construction Materials or Debris, including: Drywall, Brick, Block, Treated Lumber, Roofing, Shingles, Ceiling Tiles, Concrete)

Chief Jason Loper is retiring after 28 years of service to the citizens of Fairview Township.

Chief Loper began his career with Fairview Township in September of 1994. During his time, Chief Loper has served many roles including time as Detective, Lieutenant, and finally Chief of Police in 2012. As a result of his leadership, Fairview Township has seen a dramatic decrease in crime rates, and the Fairview Township Police Department has achieved the Premier Agency Status with the Pennsylvania Accreditation Commission. Lt. Holland looks forward to building on Chief Loper's legacy and ensuring that the Fairview Township Police Department remains a premier law enforcement agency.



The Fairview Township Police Department is proud to introduce you to their newest officer, Officer Liam Cash. Officer Cash is a 2019 graduate of Shippensburg University. Officer Cash has worked as a police officer previously for the Folcroft Borough Police Department and most recently as a Deputy for the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office. Officer Cash started work on August 24th, 2022.

The Police Department was presented an accreditation certificate as well as a plaque recognizing the Fairview Township Police Department as a Premier Accredited Agency. James Adams, Accreditation Program Coordinator for the Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Organization, was on hand to make the presentation. The Fairview Township Police Department was first accredited in February of 2004 and was one of only 11 agencies in the Commonwealth to reach this achievement at that time. In 2019, we attained the Premier Agency Status which we retained during this latest re-accreditation period. The Accreditation Commission considers their premier agencies to be in the "top echelon of agencies in Pennsylvania". We are one of only twenty-four police department's in Pennsylvania that have achieved this lofty status. SHEEPFORD ROAD BRIDGE SAVED!

The West Shore Historical Society (WSHS) is very pleased to announce that York County has been awarded 1.4 million in PennDot TASA Grant funding for restoration of the Sheepford Road Bridge for pedestrian/bicycle use.

As founder of Friends of Sheepford Road Bridge (FOSB), in January 2020 I reached out to WSHS President Don Paul Shearer for assistance and advice for our "Save Our Bridge" campaign. Since that time, WSHS has worked steadfastly toward this positive outcome. It is great to see our efforts have paid off!

This success could never have happened without the support of so many. We owe many thanks to Cumberland County Historical Society, Historic Harrisburg Association, Preservation PA, Cumberland Area Economic Development Corp., Fairview and Lower Allen Townships, Cumberland and York County Commissioners, Rep. Sheryl Delozier, Rep. Dawn Keefer, Congressman Scott Perry and Senator Mike Regan. And of course to the many Friends of Sheepford Road Bridge.

As part of this process, WSHS has agreed to become the new owner of the Sheepford Road Bridge upon completion of the restoration project and will be switching our focus to fund raising for long-term maintenance and insurance for our bridge. Currently we are working with PennDOT, the State Historic Preservation Office, Cumberland and York Counties on the best possible rehabilitation plan for our bridge.

In other news, on August 2nd, WSHS participated in Fairview Township's National Night Out. It was great to meet so many of the township residents. Our next event will be a night of comedy on November 11th at the West Shore Theatre, in partnership with Cumberland County Historical Society. More information will soon be posted on our website.

As recent recipients of a PHMC Archival Records Care Grant, we are currently devising a plan to properly inventory, store, and digitize our archives. Our collection includes much information, photos, and memorabilia featuring the history of our municipalities. We would love to add more to our Fairview collection.
