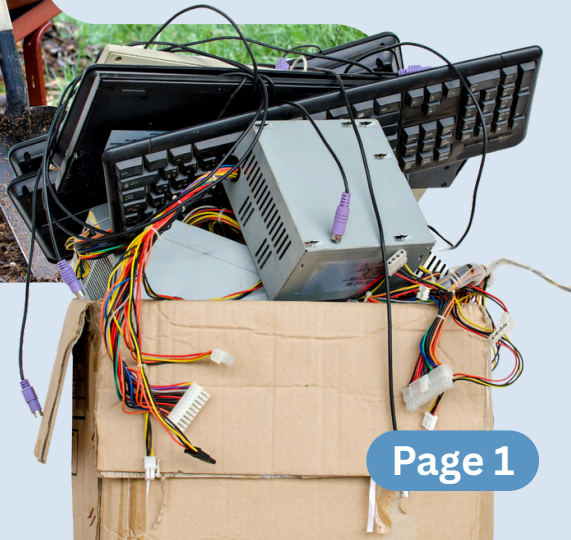

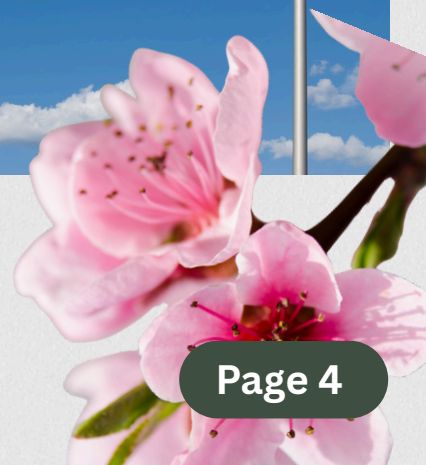

# REPORTING STREET LIGHT OUTAGES

The Township receives many calls from residents wanting to report a streetlight that has burned out. Streetlights are both installed and maintained by the electric company in your area, therefore, any outages should be reported directly to them. Be prepared to give a street address where the light is located. It is also helpful to them if you can provide the pole number, which is posted on each streetlight. PPL customers, call 1-800-342-5775, press 1, then press 4. MetEd customers, call 1-800-544-4844.



# YARD WASTE FACILITY GUIDELINES

285 SPANGLERS MILL ROAD, NEW CUMBERLAND

DIRECTIONS: FROM I-83, TAKE EXIT 39A, TURN LEFT ONTO

SPANGLERS MILL ROAD, FACILITY WILL BE ON YOUR LEFT

## The Yard Waste and Electronics Recycle Center Are for Residential Use Only. No Contractors/Businesses Permitted

If a contractor can provide proof that he/she is currently doing work for a Fairview Township Resident, they will be permitted to dispose of yard waste at the facility.

### DISPOSAL AT FACILITY

- You must be a Township Resident
- Township Employees do not load or unload materials
- You must present a valid driver's license or valid ID with name and address
- A township employee will tell you if your yard waste is acceptable
- NO dumping yard waste when facility is CLOSED

### PREPARATION FOR ITEMS

Cut limbs/branches to 4-foot lengths.

Place all acceptable yard waste in containers or bundle trimmings with rope, string or twine (no plastic or wire). Tied bundles are to be no more than 40 pounds and no longer than four (4) foot in length.

Note: Tree limbs 6" to 10" in diameter and cut in 6' lengths will be accepted ONLY if the resident takes to the facility during hours of operation.

### ITEMS NOT ACCEPTED

- Soil or Sod
- Grass Clippings
- Limbs over 6" diameter
- Tree Stumps
- Food Waste
- Bamboo
- Construction Debris  
(NO bricks, stone or concrete)

### ITEMS ACCEPTED

- Tree Limbs and/or Brush  
(4' length / 6" in diameter)
- Plants and Flowers
- Shrubbery and Pruning's
- Christmas tree's  
(NO tinsel/lights/ornaments)

# KNOW BEFORE YOU GROW:



Spring is a great time to refresh your yard with new trees and shrubs. As you plan, it's important to choose the right plants for the right spots — especially when planting near power lines. The trees you plant today will grow for years and giving them the proper space now helps prevent future outages and keeps your landscaping healthy. If you're planting tall-growing trees, be sure to place them at least 50 feet away from overhead power lines. And, try to avoid planting anything close to ground-mounted transformers so crews can access equipment safely, if needed. Not sure what to plant? PPL Electric offers a list of trees and shrubs that grow well around power lines — including Flowering Dogwoods, Blue Beeches, Black Elderberry, Witch Hazel, Mountain Laurel and more. And before any digging project, call 811 at least three business days ahead to have underground utilities marked. A little planning goes a long way in keeping your home — and your power — safe. ## ELECTRONICS RECYCLING

In Pennsylvania certain electronics are restricted by law from being disposed of in the trash due to the toxic metals they contain. The Covered Device Recycling Act (CDRA), Act 108 of 2010, requires the following “covered devices” to be recycled in PA: Computers, Computer Peripherals (keyboard, mouse, printer, etc.), Computer Monitors, and Televisions. YCSWA provides a FREE Electronics Recycling Program. All York County residents can bring electronics to our Small Load Drop-Off Area located at the York County Resource Recovery Center on Blackbridge Rd. to be recycled at no cost. # FAIRVIEW TOWNSHIP K9 PROGRAM

**HONOR. LOYALTY. DUTY.**



The Fairview Township Police Department is looking to bring Police K9 program back to the Department for the first time in over 20 years! Those that have been around awhile may remember K9 Officer Chiko, a German Shepherd who served Fairview Township with distinction from August of 1994 until April of 2002 with his handler, Officer Robert Swank.

The return of our Police K9 program will see us bringing onboard a “floppy-eared” dog who will specialize in person tracking and narcotics detection. He will not be cross-trained as a bite-dog. It is our intention that the first member of our new unit fit within our community policing identity and be able to participate in the many community events that we are involved with.



Fairview Township is unique in that it is located where I-83 and I-76 (PA Turnpike) meet. We have 13 hotels in our Township and see a very large volume of drug-related crime. We envision this program making us more effective at battling the scourge of drugs in our community and reducing the number of drug overdoses that we see.

Not to be overlooked will be the K9’s training related to person tracking. This will enable us to respond more quickly and effectively to calls where children, the elderly, those with developmental disabilities, or those suffering from critical mental health conditions that may have wandered from their home and become lost or missing. It will also enable us to have the resources to track and apprehend subjects who are wanted for crimes and flee from police. In circumstances where a K9 trained to track is needed, having quick access to these abilities can make the difference between a successful or unfortunate conclusion.

We are looking to re-establish this program while using no taxpayer funds to do so. We have already been honored to have received notable support from our business community and are well on our way to making this program a reality. ## **BEE STING PREVENTION AND FIRST AID**

Be aware of your surroundings. Watch for swarming bees when working in the flower bed, gardens or when mowing the lawn. Bees can also build nests in the rafters of a patio roof or on walls. Don't swat at bees if they come close to you, just move away slowly. Don't attract bees with sweet smells or open drinks while outside. Keep food and drinks covered.

If you get stung, don't panic. Leave the area and when in a safe area remove the stinger quickly by scraping it with an object such as a credit card. Don't squeeze it. Wash the sting area(s) and apply ice. You can apply an after bite or sting swab if necessary. If the sting area is irritated and itchy, you can take an antihistamine such as Benadryl. Watch for signs of an anaphylactic reaction such as: trouble breathing, swelling of face, throat or mouth and dizziness. If you have any of these symptoms, administer an epi pen if you have one and call 911 immediately.

# WHY DOG LICENSING MATTERS

In Pennsylvania, all dogs must be licensed at point of purchase or adoption (earliest is 8 weeks of age) or by 3 months if no transfer of ownership has occurred. All dogs that do not have a lifetime license must be licensed by January 1<sup>st</sup> of each year.

For 2026, an annual license is \$10.80, and a lifetime license is \$52.80. Discounts are available to older adults and people with disabilities.

The small license fee helps protect the millions of dogs across the state, the families who adopt or purchase them, and the communities they live in by funding the important work of the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture Bureau of Dog Law Enforcement. Dog licenses are available from your local county treasurer and other licensing agents.

Reasons for dog licensing:

- It's the law. All dogs must have a license when they are purchased or adopted.
- If your dog gets lost, a license is the best way to get them back. A license helps animal control and shelters identify your dog and get them back home safely.
- The cost of a license is less than the penalty for being caught without one. Owners who fail to license their dogs could face a fine of up to \$500, plus court costs, for each unlicensed dog.

License fees support animal control. The annual fee you pay to license your dog helps keep shelters running and supports the work of the Bureau of Dog Law Enforcement, which is responsible for ensuring the welfare of dogs, regulating dangerous dogs and overseeing annual licensing and rabies vaccinations.

## BASIC RESIDENTIAL GUIDELINES

- Trash, Recycling, one bulk item and yard waste (on scheduled dates) must be curb side by 6:00 AM on your scheduled collection day.
- No more than six (6) trash bags or containers will be collected per collection.
- Mobile Carts count as a total of three (3) bags or containers.
- Bags or containers must not exceed 32 gallons or 40 pounds.
- Bulk items that are too heavy to be lifted into a truck by two people will not be accepted.
- Call Penn Waste to schedule collection of appliances containing freon (air conditioners, refrigerators, freezers, etc.)
- No construction debris will be collected curb side.

# WASH YOUR CAR THE SMART WAY!



Water that runs off a car when it is washed in a driveway, street, or parking lot can contain substances that negatively impact water quality. Water entering storm drains does not undergo treatment before it is discharged into our waterways. Therefore, minimizing your impact is extremely important!



## THINGS YOU CAN DO TO MINIMIZE YOUR IMPACT

- Use biodegradable cleaners (Yes, Turtlewax is an eco-friendly, biodegradable product)
- Minimize water usage. Use a spray gun with flow restriction to minimize water volume and runoff
- Wash on an area that absorbs water, such as gravel or grass. This can filter water before it enters groundwater, storm drains, or creeks. Avoid washing cars on concrete or asphalt pavement unless it drains into a vegetated area
- Only let wash water soak into the ground as long as you are using biodegradable cleaners
- Empty wash buckets into sinks or tubs
- Create a barrier using sandbags to collect waste water and distribute it to garden plants
- Avoid using acid-based wheel cleaners or hose-off engine degreasers

## PENNSYLVANIA URBAN NUTRIENT MANAGEMENT - SPRING GREENING

### Spring to Life.

As the snow slowly melts away, the birds begin to sing and fresh life bursts from the soil heralding the approach of Spring and the lawn maintenance season. For the 1 million-plus acres of home lawns in Pennsylvania, selecting and implementing an appropriate lawncare management program to promote healthy and aesthetically pleasing lawns is not only important to homeowners, but is also essential to protecting our waterways.

### Know What's Best. Soil Test.

The first step to understanding what your lawn really needs to be lush, following soil test recommendations, reading fertilizer label instructions, and using a properly calibrated spreader will ensure the right amount of nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium are applied, while reducing nutrient loss and fertilizer cost. Soil Health. It's the bottom line. Maintaining a happy, healthy soil is imperative to your lawn's success. Soil is the foundation for your lawn and is home to a multitude of microorganisms that are essential for plant growth. Take the time to support your soil by incorporating some simple practices into your lawn care program. Your lawn and wallet will thank you.

### Keep it open.

Routine soil aeration can help reduce soil compaction. Good soil structure is essential for proper root growth, healthy microbe communities, and the movement and exchange of water, air, and nutrients.

### Raise it up.

Maintain a taller lawn by only cutting 1/3 of the grass blade with each mowing. Taller lawns slow runoff and promote deeper roots, which reduces lawn stress and improves soil structure.

### Put it back.

Return nutrients and organic matter back to the soil by mulching your leaves and grass clippings. For more soil management strategies, contact your local county conservation district or Penn State Extension office.

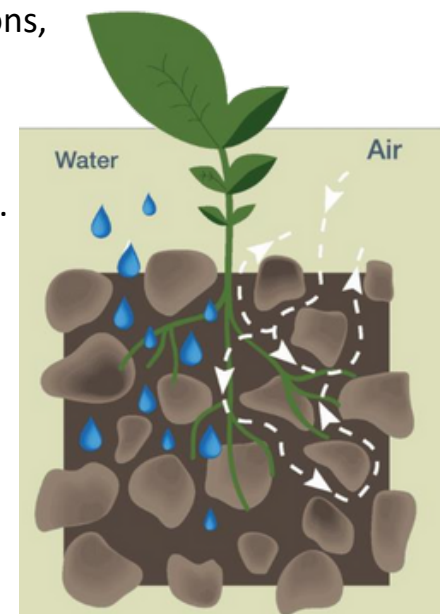


Figure 1. Good soil structure has adequate space (pores) between aggregates to alleviate compaction so that air, water and nutrients can reach plant roots.

# PENNSYLVANIA URBAN NUTRIENT MANAGEMENT - SPRING GREENING - CONTINUED

## Green Lawns – Clean Streams

Pennsylvania's 2022 Fertilizer Law amendments were developed to protect Pennsylvania waterways and the waterways downstream. As a bonus, following the limitations in the law will boost your bottom line by ensuring that your investment doesn't wash away. The 2022 law established the following nitrogen and phosphorus limits for turf fertilizer applications.

- Nitrogen is limited to 0.9 pounds of total nitrogen and 0.7 pounds of available nitrogen per 1000 ft<sup>2</sup> per application.
- No phosphorus can be applied unless establishing or repairing turf.
- Nitrogen and phosphorus rates can be adjusted based on soil test recommendations and/or if using an enhanced-efficiency fertilizer.

In addition, to the nutrient limitations, the law also established application parameters to prevent direct movement of fertilizer nutrients into our streams:

- Do not apply fertilizer if a heavy rain event is expected.
- Keep fertilizer away from drainage ditches, storm drains, or water. Maintain a 15-foot buffer from the banks of all waterways.
- Remove fertilizer that lands on impervious surfaces (driveways, sidewalks, roads, parking lots).

## Working Together for Clean Water

With ever growing access of managed turf in Pennsylvania, controlling what goes into waterways is ALL of our responsibility. Help protect Pennsylvania's waterways by being wise when you fertilize! ## MOWING & FERTILIZING

Fertilize Your Lawn the Easy Way - Grass clippings contain nitrogen and phosphorus and will fertilize your lawn for free. Save yourself the time and hassle of removing your clippings and let them go to work for your lawn.

- Mow to a height of 2 ½ to 3 inches
- Mow only when grass is dry
- If you think your lawn may need additional fertilizer, test your soil first.

# HEALTHIER LAWNS/GARDENS FEWER PESTICIDES

- Grow native plants that are adapted to our climate and pests
- Spread mulch thinly at the base of trees to prevent mower damage
- Water your lawn deeply, but only every several days. Mow to 2 ½ to 3"
- Rotate your garden crops, just as farmers do
- If you find a pest damaging one of your plants, know what it is, what it does, and the best methods for treatment before taking action. PSU Extension ([extension.psu.edu/pests](http://extension.psu.edu/pests)) is a great place to start learning
- When weeds sprout hand dig or spot treat them with herbicides.
- If pesticides are needed, use insecticidal soaps or "Bt."



## DO NOT BLOW GRASS INTO THE ROAD

When mowing your lawn, keep in mind it is illegal to blow the clippings onto the street. You are required to remove them from the street when finished. Section 252-35B of the Fairview Township Stormwater Management Ordinance states:

"No person shall allow or cause to allow, discharges into the MS4 (Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System) or discharges into waters of the Commonwealth, which are not composed entirely of stormwater." Grass clippings left in the street are washed away by stormwater and deposited in the stormwater system causing storm drains to clog, back up and flood. The grass also releases nitrogen into the stormwater system and ends up in our local waterways. Equally important is the impact this has to the environment and the unsafe conditions it can cause the traveling public, especially motorcyclists and bicyclists. Please note that the Fairview Township Yard Waste Recycling Facility DOES NOT accept grass clippings! The best option is to mulch the clippings when you mow rather than gathering the clippings. **Fairview Township Codes Administration office is responsible for many functions within the Township, including, but not limited to, the administration of Subdivision/Land Development Ordinances, enforcement of the Zoning Ordinances as well as the issuance of Building and Zoning permits.**

Summer is Coming - Property Maintenance Reminders:

- Maintain grass (keep 8 inches or shorter)
- Maintain height of trees/branches hanging over sidewalks (8ft.) and roadways (15ft.).
- Trash Receptacles must be removed from curb within 24 hours of scheduled pick-up day.

PA UCC mandates that residential reviews be conducted within a maximum of fifteen (15) business days and commercial reviews within thirty (30) business days. Should you have questions as to whether a permit is required for the purposed work, please give the Codes office a call at (717) 901-5220. See Examples of work requiring a building/zoning permit on page 25.

## EXAMPLES OF WORK REQUIRING A ZONING PERMIT

- Construction and/or installation of a fence
- Construction and/or installation of a shed, unattached carport, or unattached garage under 400 square feet
- Construction and/or installation of a patio, including paver patio or porch with no roof or walls
- Construction and/or installation of a walkway on the property other than the sidewalk along the street
- Construction and/or installation of a deck is less than 30" high
- Widening, replacing or adding newly paved areas to an existing driveway

## EXAMPLES OF WORK REQUIRING A BUILDING PERMIT

- Building an addition onto our house, including attached garages and carports
- Above ground and in ground swimming pools, even "wall-less" and portable pools! Any pool that is deeper than 24" needs a permit to put it back up every year
- Adding a roof to a patio, porch, or deck
- Construction and/or installation of doors and windows, if the new doors and windows are a different size
- Putting new shingles on your roof
- Plumbing, Mechanical or Electrical
- HVAC Generator

## EXAMPLES OF WORK **NOT** REQUIRING ANY PERMIT

- Replacing a garage door (however, replacing with an electric door will require an electrical permit)
- Wallpaper, carpet, tile, paint, and interior cabinetry such as kitchen cabinets
- Repair to existing structures such as floorboards in a deck
- Replacing or installing siding on a house

# REMINDER TO ALL LANDLORDS

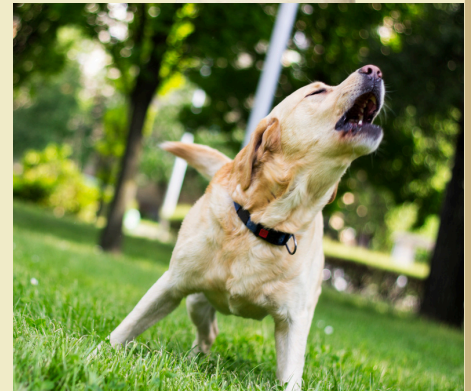
